## **NATIONAL CABINET**

National Cabinet is Australia's premier interjurisdictional body, providing the Prime Minister, Premiers and Chief Ministers with a forum to work collaboratively on issues of national significance. National Cabinet's priorities are refreshed on a regular and ongoing basis.

A representative of Local Government will be invited to meet with National Cabinet once each year, acknowledging the role it has in productivity.

Development of an NDIS Financial Sustainability Framework
